

STANFORD RINGING GROUP ANNUAL REPORT 2018

Summary

- In 2018 the Stanford Ringing Group (SRG) ringed 6,604 new birds.
- The group also re-trapped 1,912 birds.
- Nineteen Stanford birds were controlled at other sites.
- The group also controlled 19 birds, ringed at other sites.
- The total number of birds processed was therefore 8,516.
- The SRG processed a total of 63 species.
- Environmental management work continued as usual from January through to March. Many thanks to all who took part.
- Many thanks also to all those who helped during the year and to Severn Trent Water and Park Farms for allowing access to their land.
- We would also like to thank Severn Trent Water for financing the feeding station in Blower's Lodge Bay and for continuing to support our activities.
- Once again, foreign recaptures generally confirmed that our warblers fly down the west coast of France and the Iberian peninsula en route to West Africa for the winter.

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Introduction

Birds have been ringed at Stanford Reservoir since 1976. The full story of the ringing and associated wildlife activities can be found on the group's website at www.stanfordrg.org.uk. Birds are ringed as a group activity, weather permitting, from April to the end of December. From January to March, the group, augmented by helpers, undertake conservation work to enhance the area for birds. The main activities include cutting back broad leaf saplings to encourage the scrub which warblers and other breeding birds require, and clearing out the rides which are used to mist-net birds. A feeding station is supplied and maintained on a weekly basis in Blower's Lodge Bay with seed, nuts and fat balls.

Most birds were trapped using mist-nets, with occasional use of traps for specialist species such as Meadow Pipit. The main site used was centred around Blower's Lodge Bay, with supplementary use of the Leicestershire Paddock in summer. All sessions were conducted from dawn until approximately midday, with the exception of one evening session to ring in a Starling roost.

By law, wild bird ringing in the UK is licensed by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). The procedures of BTO's *Ringers' Manual* (2001) were followed throughout to secure the welfare of the birds.

All extraction, ringing and recording was carried out by group members who are either ringers licensed by the BTO, or are trainees under their direct supervision. All data were entered into the BTO's data manager IPMR and were submitted electronically.

The Ringing Year

During 2018 there were group ringing sessions at weekends, augmented by midweek individual or small group sessions.



The group normally does not convene for bird ringing until April, when the first migrants return, the completion of conservation work at weekends being prioritised. The small totals in this period illustrate occasional midweek individual ringing sessions, weather permitting.

The sixth year of the BTO's Constant Effort Scheme was completed successfully. The CES runs largely from May until August, with migration making up the bulk of birds from mid August until (approximately) mid October. The Tree Sparrow population was monitored as part of the BTO's Ringing for Adult Survival census.

The nest box ringing team was lead by our Secretary AGH, and added large numbers of ringed pulli to the annual totals, specifically regarding our Owls, Doves, Swallows, Tree Sparrows and Tits.

The numbers in November and December were then boosted by numbers of migratory thrushes, mainly Redwing and Fieldfare, but also including Blackbird and Song Thrush, and of finches including Greenfinch and Lesser Redpoll.



As can be seen, total numbers ringed were slightly down on previous years, probably accounted for by a damp and cool Autumn. However the area remains highly productive, particularly with regards to our main target species, the warblers and other breeding passerines and migratory warblers.

Annual Species Accounts

Non- Passerines

This was a good year year for this group, including record numbers of Stock Dove, both species of resident Owl and Common Snipe (although only one of the latter has been ringed previously!). Two Cuckoos were an exciting addition. Severn Trent kindly supplied two floating platforms to encourage Common Tern to breed, and we were delighted to be able to ring two pulli, the first since 1998.

Larks, Pipits and Wagtails

This was a record year for Tree Pipit. Although a total of only 10 have been ringed at Stanford, they have all been trapped between 20 and 24 August in each year, so this has proven to be a very brief window of opportunity to ring this elusive species. This was also the second best year for Grey Wagtail; all other numbers were in line with previous years.

Warblers

This was a productive year for our resident warblers, albeit with only one juvenile Cetti's Warbler and one Grasshopper Warbler being ringed as proof of breeding. The other species had good if not exceptional breeding years. The autumn brought two rarities, a single Yellow Browed Warbler (the fourth ever) and a single Marsh Warbler, the first since 2000!

<u>Crests, Tits, Treecreeper</u>

This group had mixed results. Firstly, Blue Tits had their best ever year and Long Tailed Tits had their second best. In addition Great Tits had a good but not exceptional year. By contrast Willow Tit numbers, never an abundant species at Stanford, were poor, and the group did not ring any Marsh Tit nor Nuthatch at all. The single Spotted Flycatcher was a passage bird, so the species relative abundance cannot be implied from this.

A pleasant surprise was a single Siskin, the first to be ringed in three years.


